Meet our 2021 Scroggs-Raper Scholarship recipients

This year's bumper crop of 12 recipients includes nine enrolled in Virginia Tech's Department of Agriculture & Applied Economics, one attending Virginia State University and a student at both Southside Virginia Community College and Virginia Western Community College.

Morgan Bright earned her associates degree in agriculture at Southside Virginia Community College and will begin attending Virginia Tech this fall. She grew up near Lake Gaston, was active in 4-H and served in leadership roles for her church's youth group. Passionate about reducing pollution, especially plastic, she has participated in several beach cleanup efforts. A job with Meherrin River Forest Products led to earning their scholarship and invitation to speak at the Sustainable Forestry Initiative conference. "In my career, I want to make a difference in the conservation of our waters and lands," Morgan explained.






VCC members donate to support Virginia's 4-H Camps
