GA camp develops future leaders

Seven top participants from this year's Virginia Institute on Cooperative Education (VICE) - Ruth & Rachel Haile, Alana Henegar, Bruce Jones, Cole Knicely, Hailey Lusk and Skyler Weaver — traveled to the Georgia FFA Center in Covington for the Georgia Cooperative Council's leadership camp in mid-July. Forty students sponsored by various co-ops took part in the five-day camp, which included team-building activities and a wide variety of presenters.

"The Georgia FFA/FCCLA Center provides a great setting," said Adam Shiflett with Farm Credit of the Virginias, who served as a chaperone along with VCC Executive Secretary Mary Howell. The action-packed agenda included field trips and plenty of time outdoors where participants could scale a climbing wall, negotiate a high rope and zoom down a zipline, as well as race through a mud run that developed camaraderie and team spirit. Each team created a cooperative business of their choice at that start of the week, and were able to update their business plan as their understanding of co-ops grew before making a final presentation. 
Meet our 2023 Scroggs-Raper Scholarship recipients

Generous donations by Luther Raper and Claude Scroggs established the Scroggs-Raper Scholarships, which have been awarded since 2013 to students at Virginia's land grant universities and colleges studying topics related to agriculture. This year's 12 recipients include seven enrolled at Virginia Tech, one attending Virginia State University and four at Virginia Western Community College.

Jaiden Cain grew up near Harrington, Del., and is a senior at Virginia Tech. While a communications intern at Supporters of Agricultural Research (SoAR), she was part of winning FFA teams in agricultural communications and marketing. A member of Tech's Dairy Club, she enjoys volunteering at events to educate others about agriculture and dairy farming. "Co-ops keep the balance between producers and consumer, allowing both to benefit from the exchange," she writes, adding, "My goal is to help alter the public's incomplete understanding of agriculture and for more people to understand its key role in everyday life," she writes. After graduation, Jaiden plans to help on herfamily's grain farm and pursue a career in ag marketing/communications.



Abigail Clark of Boone's Mill, Va., is earning her associate's degree in agricultural science from Virginia Western Community College (VWCC). She plans to work as a licensed veterinary technician while taking classes to prepare for Blue Ridge Community College's pre-veterinary program. She volunteers at the Franklin County Humane Society and works at Noah's Ark animal complex. "Co-ops encourage local farming and businesses, and create equity throughout our communities," she writes.



When her business was shut down during the COVID pandemic, Shellie participated in Roanoke Food Cooperative's program to match food assistance funds to be able to afford quality organic fruits and vegetables for her family. After graduation, she plans to combine her agriculture skills and love of bringing people joy to create gardenscapes for visitors to enjoy at theme parks, state fairs and other tourist attractions.

Our third recipient attending VWCC, **Eve Green** of Roanoke explains, "I've been at my current job 25 years and am currently office manager. At almost age 50, I decided on a career change. My initial goal was zoology, but I've since become more interested in agriculture and forestry." Eve fosters and trains rescue dogs and enjoys doing "anything that gets me outdoors!"



Lorien Griffith of Blue Ridge, Va., writes that she was home-schooled, with part of her education provided by local education co-ops. After she completes her studies in agriculture at VWCC, she plans to start a small sustainable farm to provide food for her family and community. "I have a passion for agriculture and education and may even start my own co-op to help more people learn about farming!"

Grayson Haskins is a sophomore at Virginia Tech's College of Agriculture & Life Sciences. A member of VTs Dairy Club, as part of Virginia Farm Credit Dairy Days at the 2022 State Fair, he helped provide 850 fresh milkshakes to attendees while sharing the role of cooperatives in the "Milk for Good" program. He learned about the Virginia State Dairymen's Association while doing project research for his Entrepreneurship in Agriculture class. "I plan to major in agribusiness management with a minor in dairy science," he writes, adding that his participation in team sports helps him learn how to manage disappointment and uncertainty, while developing resilience & mental toughness.

Starting her sophomore year at Virginia Tech, **Brooke Hodges** plans to major in agribusiness. She actively volunteers in her hometown of Bedford while working at Huddle House to help cover tuition costs. "In my hometown, both Farm Bureau and Southern States have a huge impact on the people and life around us, and I am looking forward to helping ensure the highest possible yield of crops in once I complete my education."
