Wenger & French recognized with Council awards

Norman Wenger, Rockingham Cooperative's longtime CEO, and Thomas French, a young dairy farmer from Woodstock, Va., each were presented with an award Oct. 5 at the Virginia Cooperative Council's Co-op Month breakfast, held at The Olde Dominion Agricultural Complex in Chatham, Va.

Wenger recently retired after 49 years spent helping his cooperative grow to become of one of the Shenandoah Valley's most successful businesses. He earned the Career Cooperative Leadership Award for both his contributions to Rockingham Cooperative and the development of its Farm Ministry, a nonprofit that he helped create.

"Under Norman's guidance, our co-op has been a top supporter of youth livestock shows across the counties we serve," said Adam Ford, Rockingham Cooperative's marketing manager. Ford explained, "The Farm Ministry supports our farmer members by using donated funds to purchase products they produce, then, in turn, donating them to the less fortunate in the communities we serve."

Thomas French, the Young Cooperator Award recipient, serves as herd manager for the French Brothers Dairy in Maurertown. This Shenandoah County native provides outstanding service to his community, offering guided tours of his family's dairy to a wide range of community organizations, schools, and interested groups. His tours not only offer an upclose look at farming and dairy production on the 1,600-acre farm, but he also details how using robotic milkers has revolutionized the milking process by reducing labor costs while enhancing efficiency and animal welfare.

Thomas was nominated by the Maryland & Virginia Milk Producers Cooperative. In addition to MDVA, he and his family belong to Culpeper Farmers' Cooperative, Premier Select Sires,

Members asked to support VICE scholarships when renewing

For decades, the Virginia Institute on Cooperative Education (VICE), a three-day leadership conference, has been offered free of charge to participating high school students, even if not specifically sponsored by a member cooperative.

"While we've hosted less than 30 students the past two years, we hope to reach 50 attendees for next year's VICE," explained VCC President Adam Shiflett of Farm Credit of the Virginias. He added that the volunteer staff cover their own expenses and that Graves Mountain Lodge has so far kept food and lodging at pre-pandemic rates for our group. "Many members already support this great event by providing one or more \$350 scholarships with their dues each year, and for 2024 renewal we ask every member to cover the \$350 cost for one student."

In mid-September, I was deeply saddened to learn of the passing of Allen Melton, my predecessor as executive secretary for the Virginia Cooperative Council. Allen had been an active VICE volunteer for nearly 50 years. After he retired from Southern States Cooperative in 2015, he managed the Council until the end of 2018, when he left to care for his beloved wife, Pamala, who passed the following year.

I first met Allen in 2013, when I began attending meetings of the Virginia Cooperative Council. Early in 2019, Allen carefully showed me all that I'd need to know to take over running the Council and was only a phone call away many

Electric co-ops introduce young women to the industry

On Nov. 3, more than 80 high school girls from across the Commonwealth participated in the third annual Co-op Girl Power Camp sponsored by the Virginia, Maryland & Delaware Association of Electric Cooperatives (VMDAEC) at their state-of-the-art training center in Palmyra, Va.

This interactive experience helped participants learn about a variety of career paths in the energy industry, including working on a line crew, in a substation, as a drone operator, with advanced metering technology, or as a fiber broadband technician. In eight half-hour sessions, participants had a chance to climb electric utility poles, operate a bucket truck, pilot a drone, use a hotline stick and tie wire while wearing rubber gloves. They also learned about safety on the job, fiber splicing, interviewing and looking for a job, and managing personal finances.

"More than 30 people from 10 cooperatives teamed up to make this event happen," said Jim Robertson, VMDAEC member services manager and Council board member. "Connecting more women with the energy industry has been an industry-wide goal for years," he added, noting that many line workers are needed in coming years to fill positions coming vacant due to retirements.
